Dear Staff and Students

Our country has been plunged into a series of violent and criminal acts in recent weeks. Sadly, the violent attacks on the women and the children of our beautiful country continues, despite the efforts to raise awareness of gender-based violence. Violence, in general, has also taken deeper root in our society. We see it right in our campuses. We see it in xenophobic attacks. It is now epidemic!

Being the light of society that universities should be, there is certainly more that we can do. And we must do more to eschew violence in general and in particular, gender-based violence (GBV).
